Art therapy is a mental health profession that enriches the lives of individuals, families, and communities through active artmaking, creative process, applied psychological theory, and human experience within a psychotherapeutic relationship. This practice is especially effective for young people, who may have difficulty expressing what they are feeling on the inside about their addiction as well as recovery journey.

Outreach's two residencies for adolescents – Outreach House I and Outreach House II – offer art therapy as part of their array of therapeutic services to assist our young clients with self-expression, better understanding themselves and the world around them. We are proud to share in this issue a link to the agency's 2023 Annual Report, which features some of the beautiful artwork by our adolescent and teen clients. Our programs for adults also offer opportunities for artmaking and we are proud throughout this issue to share with you some of their creative forms of expression as well.

The prevalence of trauma in people with substance use disorders is strikingly high, Thats why Outreach offers a multitude of evidence-based trauma informed trainings both internally and externally to ensure trauma is addressed so as not to compromise treatment. Outreach Training Institute Hires New Director: Welcome Dr. Kalisha Smith!

This summer Outreach welcomed Dr. Kalisha Smith as our new Director of the Outreach Training Institute (OTI). Dr. Smith's new role was previously held by Liliane Drago, who was recently promoted to a newly created leadership position Vice President of Training.At OTI, professionals can learn the latest evidence-based models, principles, and techniques in addiction and behavioral health treatment at OTI. Participants can earn CASAC hours, as well as Continuing Education Hours for Social Workers, Mental Health Counselors, and Marriage and Family Therapists. Dr. Smith is a Licensed Clinical Social Worker and Credentialed Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Master Counselor in New York State. She has worked in the behavioral health field over the last decade, explicitly focusing on substance use treatment, mental health, integrative care, and co-occurring disorders. Prior to Outreach, she held various leadership roles, including overseeing two Opioid Treatment Programs as a Clinical Director.

No stranger to OTI, prior to joining the team, Dr. Smith often collaborated with the program and took courses to advance herself professionally. In her new position, she oversees OTI's staff of coordinators, trainers, and consultants who provide the highest level of training to over 2,000 unique individuals each year. Dr. Smith's vision is to uphold OTI's stellar reputation and garner new grants to support technology to help modernize and expand so theprogram is able to serve even more students within New York State, across the Tri-State and the country.

Dr. Smith likes to say she has achieved the "social work trifecta," having completed all three of her degrees in social work. She holds a Doctor of Social Work degree from Simmons University, where she completed a capstone project that focused on the impact of burnout on Black women in social work leadership roles and culturally responsive interventions to promote proactive self-care. She earned a Master of Social Work degree from New York University, and a Bachelor of Social Work degree from Lehman College. Additionally, she has completed advanced trainings in online teaching and graduated from the Institute on Pedagogy and Technology for Online Courses at Columbia University. Social work is her life's work. She believes she was born a social worker and just went to school to add the credentials to validate that belief.

Smith is currently an adjunct professor in the social work programs at Hunter College and Lehman College and is co-writing a chapter, entitled *Gender Identity and Sexual Orientation in the Treatment of Substance Use Disorders*, for the 4th edition of the book Clinical Work with

Substance Abusing Clients. She also has a private mental health therapy practice that serves women of color in New York. In her spare time, she can be found working on her passion project, "Nurture and Elevate," where she creates journals, planners, and affirmations cards. She also hosts a yearly self-care retreat to get individuals into a space that is intentional about non-therapeutic interventions, navigating stressors and celebrating themselves.

Dr. Smith also volunteers and serves on the Mental Health Awareness Committee as its Chair for the Zeta Phi Beta Sorority Incorporated, New York City chapter as well as the Board Secretary and Marketing Consultant for a mental health and arts non-profit organization, The Darkness Rising Project. She resides in Brooklyn with her husband and two toddlers and is a full-time girl mom. We are thrilled to have Dr. Kalisha Smith join the Outreach Training Institute team and welcome her to the Outreach family.

Grant Awarded to Enhance Organizational Proficiency in Trauma-Informed Care

Research has shown that the prevalence of trauma in people with substance use disorder is strikingly high and treatment effectiveness is significantly compromised if trauma is not attended to during treatment. To address this gap in care, this past spring the Outreach Training Institute was awarded a grant from the NYS Office of Addiction Services and Supports (OASAS) and the University of Buffalo's Clinical and Research Institute of Addictions. These funds are being used to enhance organizational proficiency to provide Trauma-Informed Care and evidence-based treatment of substance use disorder, trauma, and post-traumatic stress disorder. The project is aimed at training the addiction workforce and treatment organizations. It encompasses a series of interrelated training courses and engages staff at all levels to promote a holistic organizational approach to Trauma-Informed Care.

This approach considers an individual's past and present life situations to help them understand the impact of trauma. The goal is to help people avoid re-traumatization, and create opportunities for healing, growth, and resilience. Trauma-Informed Care is based on knowledge about trauma and treatment paths, and is guided by five principles including safety, trustworthiness, choice, collaboration, and empowerment. This approach helps staff recognize signs and symptoms of trauma, and integrate trauma knowledge into policies, procedures, and practices. Trauma-Informed Care is guided by four assumptions, or "Four R's;" Realizing how trauma can affect people and groups, Recognizing signs of trauma, having a system to Respond to trauma, and Resisting re-traumatization.


The new Trauma-Informed Care trainings are being conducted in collaboration with Outreach's long-time academic partners at The Partnership to End Addiction, which is equally invested in the development of new training approaches to improve clinical care throughout the State.

OTI Plans Fall Courses that Promote Evidence-Based Treatment

In addition to its new Trauma-Informed Care, this fall the Outreach Training Institute is also convening numerous dynamic and evidence-based professional development opportunities for addiction workforce and treatment agencies. These include training courses on Medication Assisted Treatment, Family Counseling, Cultural Competency, Identifying Mental Health Disorders, Person Centered Treatment Planning and Clinical Documentation and a series of classes on Counseling Special Populations, specifically LGTBQIA+individuals, people who have experienced trauma, and for those who are/have experienced domestic violence.

In His Own Words: Aarin, graduate of Outreach House

My name is Aarin. I've been in the U.S. Army for a year. I just turned 18 two weeks ago. I want to share my story with you.

I was in a really dark place in my life. I was going down

the wrong path. I dropped out of school. I hung out with the wrong crowd. I used drugs. I was very defiant and disrespectful. I gave my mom hell. I was very angry. I didn't know what I wanted for myself. At the time I was on probation. I didn't care about what was going on in my life. I just acted on emotions. The drugs just fueled it on.

My mother looked for help and found Outreach.

Although I was hesitant, I enrolled. I didn't know how it was going to be or who was going to be there. I wanted to have freedom and do what I wanted in the streets. I had no clue how Outreach was going to be.

At first, I thought it was just a waste of time. When I gave the program a chance and got involved in the activities, I began to learn about myself and was able to communicate with my mother.

What started it was I remember I called my sister and I asked her what are you doing? She told me she was staring at a picture of me. This made me realize I had to get my life together. The mindset I had was immature and not leading me anywhere positive.

The counseling services at Outreach House taught me to communicate, express myself and listen. I learned to deal with my problems without the use of drugs. I just knew if I started again, it would be hard for me stop, and I didn't want to go through that process again.

Although each person had a different story and reason for being at Outreach, everyone is given the opportunity to do individual and family therapy. A full day of onsite schooling, fun activities, sports and trips, and life skills that are essential for day-to-day life.

I graduated on my mom's birthday January 18, 2023. I was leaving behind my new Outreach family but had to grow and seek bigger and better opportunities. These opportunities will mean a lot for me in the future.

I decided to go to the New Jersey Youth Challenge Academy. There I earned my High School Diploma and graduated as the 55th class in military training environment. Primary focuses were discipline, becoming responsible and respectful. The structure of the program at Outreach House had prepared me well for this next challenge.

They offered a variety of courses, careers, and other skills. I enlisted and swore in with the United States National Guard. The training was extremely challenging and stressful. The sergeants were very strict and harsh. It took me time to realize that there is a reason why they do what they do. I survived and became a stronger and better person. I began basic training in South Carolina and graduated from Virginia. I am currently waiting for my deployment instructions. My options are Germany, Hawaii, or Japan.

My journey has been difficult. I had very difficult tasks, drills and training. Overcoming my fears and pushing myself to my highest potential is the most rewarding feeling.

Outreach was my first steppingstone. I'll be forever grateful and thankful to the staff. I'm going to climb until I become a sergeant in the Army.

I must make my mom proud. She is my world. Most importantly, I have to be proud of myself. To the current residents at Outreach House, I can do it, I will do it, so can each and every one of you.

Exchange's Tokens for Bags® Program

Outreach has been selected as a recipient of the Buffalo Exchange Tokens for Bags® program from now through December 2024. People can donate to Outreach just by shopping at Buffalo Exchange's store in Williamsburg, Brooklyn, located at 504 Driggs Avenue.

Buffalo Exchange buys, sells and trades lightly used vintage clothing at its 40 different locations across the United States. In lieu of plastic bags, the Tokens for Bags® program offers customers to make a purchase of one "token" valued at five cents (the cost to produce a plastic bag) to donate to one of several local charities selected by each of their stores. To date, the program has generated over \$962,840 for hundreds of local nonprofit organizations since 1994 and has saved over 19.25 million plastic bags from the landfill.


